Attendance



As we approach the end of term, we would like to remind parents and carers that children who have frequent absences from school have gaps in their learning, miss social time with friends, and engage in fewer enrichment activities. The impact of this on student outcomes is significant, with lower attainment at GCSE which can affect long-term life chances. Every student should be aiming for at least 95% attendance in each school year and even that equates to fifty lessons missed.

We have seen recent improvements in attendance for individual students and year groups, which is encouraging but this momentum must continue in the new academic year. Bleed Kit Fundraiser







During July we have been educating our community on the dangers of knife crime and raising funds to purchase bleed kits that could be used in the event of someone being stabbed. We have been working alongside campaigner Laura Hughes who established 'In Memory of Colin McGinty', a #kNOwknifecrime initiative that aims to educate young people on the wider lasting impact of knife crime and dissuade the carrying of knives and other weapons after the death of her brother, Colin McGinty in 2001. Our ambition is for the kits to be hosted by retailers and public venues in our community, especially in places where young people may be vulnerable or gather in larger numbers.

During the week beginning 3 July we had an assembly roadshow, a relay between our Trust schools and various fundraising events including a donation day. Nine of our students ran from Maghull High School to Kew Woods Primary in Southport, which was over nine miles. They did an amazing job, raising additional money on the way and passing a symbolic bleed kit to Kew Woods who then ran to the next school. We are now only twenty pounds from our fundraising target. Hally's Success




